

"Wild Women of the West": This service is a celebration of women's history month, in general, and of a little-known part of our Unitarian Universalist heritage, in particular. Although there will not be nearly enough time for me to tell you all of the fascinating stories about these women who played an important part in shaping who we are, I hope to give you enough of a broad picture of their exploits that you will want to find out more about them. One of the best sources for doing so is the book, *Prophetic Sisterhood: Liberal Women Ministers of the Frontier, 1880-1930*, by Cynthia Grant Tucker, a book that will be my "other voice" on this Sunday. Come and find out: just how wild they really were; what Transcendentalists have to do with these women; and why we are so very fortunate to have them as role models, even more than a hundred years later!

The Prairie Book Club will discuss *Final Salute: The Story of Unfinished Lives*, by Jim Sheeler. The book is an under-told story from the Iraq war, an account of how the families of the dead are notified, the lost loved ones enshrined and their memories preserved and honored. This book enters a number of homes and follows their occupants through the grieving process. Readers will learn how shielded we are from the casualties of war. #### ...and Now a Word from the Rev.

- Musings from Sandy

Gazing wistfully at my bicycle recently, I wondered if I would ever ride it again -- before either it or I became too rusty to do so. When I first lived in Madison in the mid-1970's, there were many years when I bicycled all year round, right through the winter. Not this winter, though! I have reached a threshold made up of cold and ice, beyond which I am reluctant to go. I find it very difficult to get past this threshold even just to walk to the garage to get the car.

Thinking about this very real obstacle of ice and cold led me to wonder if there is an analogy between this physical threshold and the thresholds -- the obstacles -- we too often seem unable to get beyond in our human interactions. Do we sometimes reach a threshold of ice and cold in our relationships? Do our communication skills become rusty every once in awhile? Do we forget how to be kind and compassionate towards and caring of each other, no matter how irritated and frustrated the "other" makes us?

In the midst of all this pondering, I found a wonderful, perfect quote by Laila Ibrahim, from a book of meditations titled "Bless the Imperfect: Meditations for Congregational Leaders", which I share with you, slightly adapted...

"We are not in church (or fellowship or meeting house or society!) to be with people who want to sing the same music, or rally for the same cause, or attend the same retreats. We are in church to learn to love better. And learning to love better can only happen when we love past our disappointments and return to a place of acceptance and affirmation. This is true in our personal lives, in our work lives, and in our church lives. It is a deep spiritual practice."

I invite all of you to enter into this deep spiritual practice with me in which we learn to communicate better and to love more deeply.
