Flower Ceremony

The Flower Festival (aka Flower Ceremony or Flower Communion), is an annual ritual that celebrates beauty, human uniqueness, diversity, and community. Originally created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek of Prague, Czechoslovakia, the Flower Ceremony was introduced to the United States by Rev. Maya Capek, Norbert's widow.

In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower. Each person places a flower on the altar or in a shared vase. The congregation blesses the flowers and they're redistributed. Each person brings home a different flower than the one they brought.

### Sunday, July 18, 2021

"Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America - Madison" by Gwyneth Hughes

This presentation will describe the underlying motivations and ongoing work of Moms Demand Action in the gun violence prevention movement. We'll examine how the "guns everywhere" philosophy is at odds with human rights and imagine what a future free from gun violence might look like. We'll also discuss actions Wisconsinites can take to advocate for gun sense in our community, state, and nation.
