This cookbook will be something we all treasure, and we need your contributions to make it truly special.

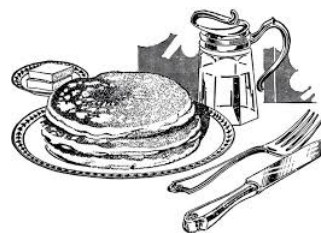
